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Abstract

This project consists of researching children's literature across age groups that are available on divorce. After researching what age categories lack books regarding divorce, this project examines those books from one age category. What books are available for children regarding divorce of parents? What topics are covered and what voids exist? What are key concepts that children of this age should be familiar with?


Research Results


